When coal was discovered in Eastern lowa, the Burlington, Cedar Rapids, and Northern Railroad saw a reason to extend a line 70 miles west from the Mississippi River. In 1879, new depots were established every seven miles, effectively establishing towns that included, from east to west, Lone Tree, Riverside, Kalona, and Wellman.

Today these are the cities in which we live, work, and play, and we warmly invite you to join us, whether for a weekend getaway or the next phase of your life.

As the second-largest city in Washington County with more than 2600 residents, Kalona is our heart. Nicknamed the Quilt Capital of Iowa, Kalona's storybook downtown hosts a perfect mix of shops selling fabrics, quilts, antiques, and locally made treasures. As you walk down the sidewalks inlaid with 40 different brick quilt blocks,

you'll discover our local brewery, chocolatier, and coffeehouse, as well as our very own ice cream treat, the Kalona Bar.

Kalona is also well-known for its Amish heritage. The Amish were among the first Europeans to settle here in the 1840s, and their cooking and craftmanship continue to influence our local culture here today. Old Order Amish farm the land as newer-order Amish build modern businesses in the countryside selling gifts, baked goods, and eBikes. Their Mennonite decedents live here and in our neighboring cities, giving our community a strong base of service-mindedness and generosity.

Wellman is Kalona's neighbor to the west. A quieter city of about 1500, Wellman residents appreciate the benefits of small-town living, such as friendly neighbors and being able to walk to the city park and YMCA for recreation. For visitors, Wellman offers unique experiences to enjoy, such as one of only four sand green golf courses left in the state, and a retro-cool, recently remodeled roller-skating rink. Some of the best pie you'll ever eat can be found in a local cafe.

Riverside flanks Kalona to the east. With a resident population of about 1060, Riverside sparkles with energy, as it is easy to access from U.S. Highway 218 and home to the Riverside Casino and Golf Resort, a sprawling complex that hosts three restaurants and performances by world famous entertainers. Riverside also holds the unique distinction of being the future birthplace of Captain James T. Kirk, a fictional character from science fiction series Star Trek.

Follow Iowa Highway 22 seven miles east of Riverside, and you'll find Lone

Tree, a cozy city of about 1350. Named for a solitary giant elm tree that served as both landmark and shelter for over 200 years – the historic site of which can still be visited — Lone Tree is a close-knit community that values its history. In late summer, great family fun can be had at the festival that fills the city center.

Each of our four cities hosts events throughout the year that draw crowds from all over, including the Kalona Quilt Show & Sale, Wellman's 4th of July, TrekFest, and Lone Tree Fall Fest. Cultural and recreational activities abound, with museums, parks, and golf courses available for enjoyment.

Kalona and surrounding Washington County is truly the land of milk and honey. Enjoy discovering our charming cities and pleasant way of life.

great place to exercise or catch a Lone Tree Lions basketball game.







Celebrate Halloween at the Kalona Historical Village on October 31, 2023, from 5:30 - 8 p.m, where local businesses decorate the historical



MIDWEST OLD THRESHERS RETURNS AUG. 31 - SEPT. 4

The Midwest Old Threshers Reunion, which was first held in September of 1950, has grown into one of the most top attended steam shows in the Midwest. Folks from all over the world come to Mt. Pleasant to get a taste of what rural farm life was back in the Midwest in the "good 'ol' days."

The Reunion unofficially kicks off Wednesday before Labor Day, with the Harvest Day Parade at 3:30 pm that runs through the four lanes of Washington St. to downtown Mt. Pleasant.

Thursday starts the five-day event that ends on Labor Day. With plenty of activities and demonstrations throughout the grounds to keep you entertained. From the North Village with the OT Smokin Gunslingers and the Golden



Slipper Saloon Girls. Hop on a train in the North Village, take a ride to the south to visit the Heritage Museum, and then climb aboard an electric streetcar to the Log Village that will transport you back to the 1850s pioneer life.

Many attractions range from steam

engines, antique tractors, antique cars, antique trucks, gas engines, steam trains, electric streetcars, horses and wagons, agricultural exhibits, interpretive historical exhibits, educational programs, and demonstrations are available throughout the Reunion grounds. There is also plenty of music around to entertain you while you sit



Celebrating traditional ways of life for 51 years

Folks in the area surrounding Kalona look forward to Fall Festival every year. With the heat of the summer finally dissipating and the harvest season underway, there is no greater pleasure than savoring delicious food outdoors with friends, neighbors, and visitors.

"It's truly a class reunion, a family gathering. That's a major tradition of what Fall Festival is all about," says Nancy Roth, Managing Director of the Kalona Historical Society. "It's something that the community looks forward to every year."

While raising funds for the Kalona Historical Village and the Mennonite Museum, both of which attendees may tour during the festival, Fall Festival offers food for both mind and body.

For kids, young minds can find engagement with pony and barrel train rides, and library-sponsored programs and crafts in addition. While being surrounded by an entire village of restored historical buildings, including a train dept built in 1879 and a stage-coach stop hotel built in 1892, kids can't help but feel wonder at a way of life long past.

Live demonstrations help activate the imaginations of both young and old on the Village grounds. How to weave, spin, and quilt are shown right in front

of your eyes, and you're free to ask questions about tasks rarely witnessed today. Broom making, cornmeal grinding, and apple butter making also happen on site, causing us to marvel and imagine a different sort of life.

The historical buildings offer more to see and absorb with their antique displays. The new nearly life-size street-scape exhibit inside the Wahl Museum on the grounds will be open for the first time, allowing visitors to enter the grocers and stockyards of a previous time and engage with local history in a way not previously possible.

Plenty of entertainment will also be on offer on both days of Fall Festival on the main stage. Bands, orchestras, and choirs from area schools will perform, as well as musical groups beloved by the community.

To keep your energy up, a huge range of food offerings will be available again this year, including worth-waiting-for apple fritters and giant soft pretzels. Cheese curds and slushies make for easy walking while eating; if you prefer to sit down for a real meal, organic burgers, chicken and shrimp po'boy sandwiches, and steak and cheese sandwiches will all be on offer. Don't miss dessert: you'll want to save room for delicious homemade pie!















Finally, don't miss the evening golf cart parade, where folks dress their golf carts in lights, antlers, and inflatable santas for a bit of small-town fun.





Please mark your calendars for November 3-4 for the Benefit, to be held on the campus of Hillcrest Academy, located eight miles northwest of Kalona (15 miles southwest of Iowa City).

The Benefit was first held in 1956, in preparation for construction of a senior living facility initially named Pleasantview Home (known simply as

Pleasantview for the past three years). In 2020 and 2021, the event, as did most public activities, entered a forced hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In the fall of '22, the Benefit returned... resulting in record numbers, both in attendance and in net proceeds.

Pleasantview is a non-profit longterm care facility that also includes Independent Living and skilled care. A 28-apartment Assisted Living facility, along with a 16-unit Memory Care center, is scheduled to open late summer 2023.







Some items date back to the late 19th century, telling the story of a city that once was home to a steel factory and two opera houses. 
Kewash Nature Trail Washington

About four miles from the trailhead in Washington, you'll cross a lattice through truss bridge over West Fork Crooked Creek that was built in 1888.



AMISH HISTORY

The association between Kalona and the Amish is an old one, for the Amish arrived in 1846, more than 30 years before Kalona was even a name. For more than 150 years, the Amish have remained and prospered in this area, becoming, in the process, an expected and accepted part of a community. Today, the Kalona area is home to one of the largest Amish-Mennonite settlements west of the Mississippi River, something that began when three Old Order Amish families established homesteads near Deer Creek the year lowa became a state.

....and much more!

During the 1850s and 1860s, numerous Amish immigrated to the region and a congregation was formed in 1851 with 27 charter members. Jacob Swartzendruber and John P. Guengerich, both of who later wrote about the early years, were the first ministers. Frederich Swartzendruber served as deacon.

Believers in a literal interpretation of the Bible, the Amish oppose anything worldly, living without electricity, telephones, automobiles and the hundreds of other conveniences of the modern world.

Firm practitioners of "waste not, want not," they live close to the soil, for they believe God meant humans to work with the land and return to it as much as they take from it. And, if there are no luxuries in the orderly Amish way of life, neither are there the complexities, confusion or haste of the modern one.

It is a life of strict discipline with carefully considered roles for man and woman, providing security at all levels. Yet, the Amish are not an isolated, forbidding group, but rather prove repeatedly to be friendly people who offer aid and service to non-Amish in times of trouble and who. like the Men-

nonites, are staunch pacifists. Unlike the Mennonites, though, the Old Order Amish have no church buildings, worshipping in homes on a rotating basis every other Sunday, alternating with German-language Sunday School.

Although the Amish regularly use English, they speak a German dialect among themselves and use High German for their worship services. Of course, through the years, the religious conferences in the area were realigned, and there is no longer a simple division of Old Order Amish and Mennonites in and around Kalona.



BUD'S CUSTOM MEATS

The beef jerky here is famous, and for good reason

If you find yourself driving down U.S. Highway 218 or lowa Highway 22 through Riverside, and you're in need of a long-lasting snack, one that you can eat both now and later and take home to share with your friends in addition, you need to stop in at Bud's Custom Meats.

Owner Doug Havel and his friendly staff will be happy to point you to what a traveler wants: Bud's famous beef jerky.

"We'll do 800 pounds of beef sticks and bologna every week, and then we also piece out pretty close to 1200 to 1500 pounds of jerky every week, which yields about 600-650 pounds of dried jerky weight. We sell a lot of jerky," Havel says.

Folks rave about the stuff. When those in the know find themselves in the area as they travel from their homes in cit-



ies like Cedar Rapids, Mount Pleasant, lowa City, Fort Madison, and Burlington, they head into Bud's Meats and stock up.

"Some people buy just one bag; other people buy 20-25 bags. 'I get up this way once a month, so I'm getting my fill now,' [they say]. A guy just left here a little bit ago; he had one of the Thank


You bags and it was heaped up," Havel chuckles.

What makes Bud's jerky so special? Havel says that their unique seasoning mix, coupled with a traditional process, set it apart.

"Our jerky is more the old-fashioned jerky," Havel explains. "It's like the [American] Indians used to do it.

They used to strip the meat out with the grain. So our jerky is really tough; you're not going to put it in your mouth and bite it and chew it and swallow it. You're going to sit there and you're going to tear it the long way and put it in your mouth and you're going to chew it for five minutes, and that flavor just stays in your mouth. That pepper and salt and everything just puts your mouth on flavor."

To make that incredible jerky, the butchers "take any piece that's out of the round – that's the hind end of the beef – and take all of the fat and the membrane off of it so it's just pure meat. Then we'll put it in the freezer and get it temped to where its half frozen, half fresh. Then we bring it out, put it on the slicer, and we slice it with the grain. Then we hand-dip each piece in our seasoning, and then it sits for 36 hours in the cooler. Then we lay







each piece out on wire racks, and then its smoked for about six hours and that dries it down. Then we cut these singles. They do about 2000 of those pieces each week," Havel says.

Bud's Meats didn't start out making jerky and meat sticks; when Havel's late dad Raymond (or "Bud," for whom the shop was named) started the butcher shop in 1984, it was because the farmer had been helping out so many neighbors with the butchering of their animals, that the state told him he either had to stop or open a shop. He opened a shop. After a couple of years of providing custom butchering services, he started experimenting with jerky. Once that original recipe was perfected, the shop has stuck with it

Havel says that he has never lost his preference for that original flavor – labeled Bud's Famous Beef Jerky – in the 39 years that the shop has offered it. But the shop does offer other spin-off flavors, such as Hot, Cajun, and Teriyaki. Havel says that occasionally they will play with new flavors, but not too



much.

Butchering animals for local producers is still a large part of Havel's business, which he purchased from his dad in 1997. "We do about 15 head of beef a week, and probably 10 head of hogs and probably 15 head of sheep each week," he says.

Once you step inside the shop, you'll find that far more is available for purchase than jerky and meat sticks should you be so inclined. An impressive range of meats, both fresh and frozen, are available, and a selection of cheeses, jams, and noodles from local producers are for sale as well.

You may expect to find steaks, burgers,

and pork chops in the freezer case, and you will; however, the selection of exotic meats may be a bit of a surprise. Bud's Meats stocks rabbit, frog legs, alligator, and sometimes even turtle.


"We sell quite a bit of frog legs, actually," Havel says. When people have fish fries, they like to throw in some alligator; when they have wild game nights, they cook up rabbit and turtle.

Bud's Meats is also a fantastic source for frozen fish and seafood, should you have trouble finding your favorites, such as walleye filets, locally. Bud's Meats has a selection of wild game fish shipped in from Canada so that the freezer is always stocked. Should you find yourself distant from Riverside but dreaming of giving Bud's Famous Beef Jerky as gifts to your friends and family during the holiday season, Bud's Meats has you covered. Online orders are accepted through their website, budscustommeatsinc. com, and the staff is used to increasing their production before Christmas in order to meet the demand, although sometimes that's a challenge.

"We'll run out [and] people will stay out there [behind the counter] and wait until the next batch comes out," Havel says. "We'll come in in the middle of the night and put more jerky on," he says, in order to keep orders filled and mouths happy.

A lot of hard work goes into keeping all of Bud's meats in stock and ready to enjoy. Are the results worth it? Drop by 3027 IA-22 in Riverside and taste for yourself. Bud's Custom Meats is open 6 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday – Friday; 8 a.m. to noon Saturday; closed Sundays.



'The living room of Kalona' celebrates 10 years

Located in a small city that attracts visitors from around the country and serves as a hub for surrounding smaller towns, Kalona Brewing Company excels at striking a balance between giving tourists an unforgettable experience and giving locals a second home.

There are good reasons to stop by the brewpub: the beer, the food, and the building. If you linger a bit and look deeply into those things, you'll gain something more: insight into the people of this community.

Let's start with the beer. "We've got 15 beers on tap that we make all inhouse. The only things that we don't

make are the cider and the soda, so there really is something for everyone to try," says General Manager Shauna McKnight.

The craft beer list includes mainstays like Kalona Classic Light Lager, Sucha Much IPA, and Lewbricator Wheat Doppelbock. Other brews are seasonal and experimental; you might find pints of pineapple Belgian, coffee-chocolate stout, or amber ale on tap at times.

"I think we've turned a lot of people from drinking Busch Light to Kalona Classic, so we're pretty proud of that," McKnight says. "Our other experimental ones are really fun as well. We've got a sour that's really popular with people who don't even like beer."

"Our staff is really knowledgeable and can guide you through the different flavor profiles and get you something that you're going to really like," she adds.

The food at Kalona Brewing Company is worth savoring. "Everything's 100% from scratch. We've been doing that since day one," McKnight says. "We try to keep our focus on local products. Our cheese curds are from the cheese factory right outside of town. Our beef comes from JimRay Farms, which is about five miles north of Kalona. We've worked hard to build those

relationships with the community."

The menu may shift with the seasons, but some items won't budge: beer-battered cheese curds and onion rings is one of the most-ordered appetizers; wood-fired pizzas made with fresh herbs and local meats aren't going anywhere. Soups, salads, sandwiches, and entrees will satisfy a range of appetites and preferences.

The quality of the beer and food will be evident the moment they cross your palate, but the significance of the building in which Kalona Brewing Company is housed may not be evident based on appearance. To appreciate that, you'll need a bit of insider knowledge.

Head Brewer Warren "W" Yoder is a fount of historical information when it comes to Kalona. The life-long resident spent a portion of his childhood hanging out inside the building in which he now performs alchemy on wheat and hops; in the 1970's and 80's, his mom worked as a seamstress at Ellen's Sewing Center, one of the businesses previously at 405 B Avenue.

"This was known as the B-4 building because it's on the corner of B Avenue and 4th Street, and it originally was built in 1946," he says.

The brick building began as an Allis-Chalmers tractor dealership; it then became a Famers Supply John Deere dealership. A car dealership and auto repair shop followed; then it was occupied by Ellen's Sewing Center in half the space, and a weekend flea market took place in the other. In 2012, the building changed ownership again and Kalona Brewing Company was created. "My mom's sewing machine was right over here where the hot liquor tank is," Yoder says, pointing out an area now filled with shiny stainless steel brewing tanks.

"It's a building that has a lot of history and a lot of connection with people from Kalona and the surrounding area, because a lot of people came to those flea markets or had memories here. It's always neat to see people who haven't been here for a while come back, and their eyes bug-out a little bit when they see what it's become," he

continues.

Although much has been updated and reconfigured inside, the brick exterior, concrete floor, and exposed river rock are all original.

Kalona Brewing Company is rooted in the community and provides a place to come together. It also extends its reach out and supports things that matter to the local population.


One recent partnership the brewery has formed is with PAWS & More, an animal shelter in nearby Washington that also serves Kalona. The building PAWS is using has deteriorated to the extent that the organization must build a new shelter, and the Kalona Brewing Company has helped it raise funds. The partnership seemed natural be-

cause "We love dogs here," McKnight says, noting that several beers have been made in memory of the staff's dogs.

The brewery makes Red Rover Cherry Belgian Ale every year and donates a portion of the sales to the Kalona Volunteer Fire Department, where Yoder's late dad was chief. It also supports local events, such as RAGBRAI (Register's Annual Great Bicycle Ride Across Iowa), and Trek Fest, a celebration of Star Trek in nearby Riverside, by setting up tents and pouring pints.

As it celebrates its 10th anniversary, Kalona Brewing Company invites you into Kalona's living room. Enjoy its beer, enjoy its food, enjoy its history, and enjoy its people.







Encounter Café Food for body and soul

When you enter Encounter Café, located in the heart of downtown lowa City, don't be surprised if you find a line to the door. This beloved bakery, breakfast, and lunch spot has a loyal following, and only part of the reason for that is the food.

The six-year-old restaurant, which doubled in space a year ago, is the project of two conservative Mennonite churches, Sharon Bethel in Kalona and New Hope in Washington. Its purpose is not financial gain, but to create a place where the church communities could offer service and love.

Manager Ray Yutzy says that when work on the restaurant was underway but not yet completed, church members gathered for a dedication prayer, which included "a request that God would provide his presence for this place, so when people come through the door, they would feel something different. That it would be an atmosphere of



friendship, love." By all indications, visitors to the restaurant do, in fact, feel the love. They also tend to reciprocate.

Intended to be a safe haven and gathering place for college students at the nearby University of Iowa, the café has become exactly that; various groups of students come in to work, socialize, and have fun on a daily basis. Four campus ministry groups use the café as a base where they're comfortable discussing the Bible, which Yutzy says

contributes to the atmosphere. "Anytime the Word of God is opened out here, that alone is an atmosphere of love and support," he says.

The café has exceeded its intentions, however; families flock to the restaurant to share stacks of pancakes and french toast, and people of all ages make the drive from Kalona to enjoy fresh-from-the-oven cinnamon rolls, scones, and soft pretzels. Friends meet for lunch, hungry for hot panini sandwiches and fresh salads.

The food served is as important as the open, friendly ambiance. Encounter Café makes bakery items from scratch and sources the highest-quality, freshest ingredients they can from local producers, including eggs from Farmer's Hen House in Kalona, and whole milk from Kalona Organics.

The restaurants' mission of "serving people and loving people" has turned out to be a financially profitable one, but the churches behind it were never out to make money. All the profits go to local charities and ministries; you'll find thank you notes filling the entryway corkboard.

"If people want to know what we're promoting," Yutzy says, "We're simply promoting the love of Jesus, by serving, then trying to live our lives in a way that they're examples of that love and that compassion. That's our motive. That's our main reason for being here."

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THE NEWS

A 132 year Kalona tradition

At a time when women could not vote, Emma Allen's decision to start a newspaper in Kalona was remarkably revolutionary. Allen was the founding editor who would inform the community and push for needed progress.

Things were already in place for Kalona to become a stable town with the establishment of a railroad depot in 1879. However, many pieces needed for a thriving town were still missing; basic things that are commonplace today, like roads and a bank, had yet to be established. Allen pushed for growth in Kalona by pleading for said roads and bank through the editorials for which she would become known.

Allen's ambitions can be compared to an adage commonly used when discussing the Field of Dreams located in Dyersville: if you build it, they will come. If Kalona could develop the needed amenities, the town could attract new residents, grow, and thrive.

In 1893, publisher J.A. Dunn started the string of 10 different publishers that would follow Allen, many of them integrating the new technologies of their time.

The method used to set type during the paper's first 29 years was known as handset. With the handset method, type is assembled line-by-line in a composing stick, and then locked in for printing. The handset method was brushed aside in June of 1918 when publisher D.C. Miller began using linotype, which needed less effort and setup, allowing for more indepth stories and larger issues. In 1973, Robert and Dora Kallaus were the final publishers to use linotype, and eventually gave it up for cold type, or photo composition.

Ron and Helen Slechta followed the Kallaus tenure in 1992. The Slechtas embraced digital photography and began utilizing the internet to send images. They were also one of the first to use color photography in a weekly paper.

In addition, the Slechtas moved the newspaper from its longtime office on 5th Street to 419 B Avenue in Kalona.

"At the time we bought the paper, it was at a location that was 10 feet wide by 60 feet deep. Those were rather cramped quarters. When this [419 B Avenue]

became available, we purchased it," said Ron Slechta.

More changes came about in September of 2016 when W. James and Bridget Johnson purchased The Kalona News, and combined it along with the Wellman Advance, Riverside Current, Highland Review, and Lone Tree Reporter into one newspaper named The News.

Ron and Helen Slechta took ownership once again in 2020 and continue to keep it relevant and accessible by offering an e-version available online and encouraging staff to utilize social media to keep the community updated on breaking news and sports.


"We try to keep up with the times," Slechta says.

"Give us then your encouragement and support and we will endeavor to give you a paper that will speak well for the enterprise of the town," Emma Allen once wrote. The current publisher and staff still abide by this agreement. From its first volume in November of 1891, to the latest issue in 2023, The News is one of the many thriving businesses in Kalona thanks to a large circulation and support from the towns they cover.
